

## Transferring to Gigaclear fibre solutions

This page lists the required steps in order. Subsequent pages contain more details.

- 1. Order Gigaclear
- 2. Order self install kit or Boxcom installation
- 3. If you do not have anti-virus software you need to install some
- 4. Set up a new free email account if you are not keeping an existing one (and tell all your suppliers and contacts that you have changed it)
- 5. Wait until you have a Gigaclear activation email
- 6. Order a Vonage telephone adaptor if dropping BT all together
- 7. Connect your Vonage adaptor using the temporary number
- 8. Make sure you are happy with both the broadband and the telephone before proceeding
- 9. If you require Vonage to transfer your existing phone number do it now (it can take up to 20 days)
- 10. Wait until the telephone works with the number you have requested
- 11. Cancel your existing broadband contract
- 12. Cancel your existing phone contract (remembering to tell them you don't need a MAC code as you are joining a cable provider)





(BT will let you keep your address, sometimes they will charge about £12 a year for this. AOL, Sky will let you keep the address for free apparently.

TalkTalk and PlusNet will not.)


There is a good case for retaining an old email address for a year in order to find out who is not using your new one, but I've just heard of BT charging £24 a year for this.






Note AVG recently changed their privacy statement and will mine browsing history. (Also has good tips on other security precautions.)
