Message from Reverend Chris Peck

Why do we 'share the peace' in church services?

Some people are puzzled by the invitation to 'share the peace with one another' in some of our church services, and there are those who dislike doing so. Why do we do it? We do it because Jesus did it. His greeting to his disciples following the resurrection was 'Peace be with you'. We are following his example when we share the peace we receive from Jesus with one another. We do it because the early church did it. Sharing the peace is an ancient, traditional practice which predates the Book of Common Prayer where it was incorporated into the blessing given by the priest at the end of the service.

So what are we doing when we share Christ's peace with one another? Sharing the peace is not simply offering a friendly hello to those sitting near you, or a time for catching up on news or reminding someone about an upcoming meeting and it does not require each worshipper to offer a sign of God's peace to every other worshipper present.

When we share the peace we are declaring the peace that Christ has made for us. We are affirming that we have a bond in Christ which is deeper than our differences. We are a people who have been given peace and have been made whole, and we are people called to make peace and bring about wholeness. Sharing the peace is a ministry to each other, assuring each other of the peace that Christ gives to us.

However, there are people who are uncomfortable shaking hands with those around them and there can be a variety of reasons for this. Everyone is entitled to feel secure and in control of their own personal space in church, and no-one should feel forced to share the peace if this is likely to violate their personal space and cause them to feel uncomfortable. When you are sharing the peace it is helpful to just make eye contact first to check that the person is comfortable receiving a handshake. When done in the right spirit, sharing the peace can be a means of blessing and a reassurance of our place in the body of Christ. The peace of the Lord be with you!

Northampton Mercury 24 December 1887: Letters to the Editor:

Sir.

Will you kindly allow me, through your valuable paper, to call attention of the surveyor and waywardens of Ravensthorpe and district to the wretched and unhealthy state of the main street. During the last month or six weeks, the road through the village has been, and is, well-nigh impassable.

There is a considerable amount of sickness in the village already and unless the streets are cleansed and repaired, and the sanitary condition generally improved, I shall be greatly surprised if there is no outbreak of endemic disease....
