Torquemeters Celebrates 70 years



Torquemeters Limited, was founded in Ravensthorpe by Mr R D van Millingen ("Mr Van"), in 1951. Today, the company is run by Mr van Millingen's sons, Ben and Jas, and has recently celebrated its 70th Anniversary.

For over 40 years, Torquemeters was situated at No 8 on the High Street in Ravensthorpe, but then moved to its current premises on the West Haddon Road in 1992. And for many years now, the company has been "recognised globally as an innovative, high quality, engineering solutions provider for Aerospace, Oil & Gas, Automotive and Industrial applications".

The following is taken from an address given by Jas Van Millingen to the recent gathering of employees (past and present) plus their families and friends, celebrating 70 years of Torquemeters Ltd.

Jas van Millingen: "The DNA of Torquemeters surely starts in the 1940's with our founder, Mr Van, as he was always known, who, as a 25-year old engineer, was one of Frank Whittle's small team in (Power Jets Limited) Lutterworth, developing the first successful jet engine. From Whittle, an exceptional engineer, Mr Van learnt the concept of design from first principles, and the importance of accurate instrumentation in determining the true performance of the engine they were developing.

"Leaving PJ at the end of the war, Mr Van joined English Electric in Rugby to design industrial and marine gas turbines for which he wanted to test the performance of a high-pressure compressor they had designed. Unable to find a suitable torque meter on the market, Mr Van set about designing a novel optical torquemeter, and when his employer took no interest in its commercial future, he decided at age 35, with little money, 3 small kids and 2 on the way, to forsake the security of a large employer, and to drop out to do his own thing!

"Later in life he explained that when he was told he had reached a level of seniority where we he was allowed to use the directors' toilets and take his tea in bone china cups, he realised he was NOT a big company man!

"The early years of the business were slow and painful, but the first export went to the USA in 1953 under the bunk of a former work colleague who happened to be emigrating to the USA and taking his honeymoon on the Queen Mary, for which, coincidentally, he had designed the rudder's thrust bearing, in the mid-30's in his first job.

"Slowly, Torquemeters' reputation grew, particularly with the emerging gas turbine industry but also with other manufacturers of rotating machines such as pumps and compressors.

"(For me) as a child, all this activity took place in the barns of our farmhouse down the High Street which over the next 40 years got extended and expanded a bit like a Tardis, until there were around 25 people working in it.

After paying tribute to some much-valued and long-standing colleagues, Jas went on to say: "Today things have moved on a bit and even I can't quite get into not having had a drawing board for 20 years. Most of our design and analysis are done in the blink of an eye by clever computer design and analysis suites, but I keep encouraging, often in vain, our younger engineers to do a first grubby sketch of their idea on graph paper, before 'CADing' it, and to do a quick manual check of the number their spreadsheets pop out before they believe it!"(But) I'm pleased to say that we have a great and enthusiastic team in the business who are well capable of taking the business forward and we continue to punch above our weight on the global stage in providing well- designed, challenging products".

I am sure that everyone in Ravensthorpe would want to join me in offering our congratulations to Torquemeters, which over the years has been a real stalwart of the village, a generous supporter of our village charities, and a valued employer of many of our village residents. We say "thank-you Torquemeters", and wish you our very best for the next 70 years! (Ed.)

A word about Hedgehogs from Di Haves:



Have you got a hedgehog or two in your garden? Many people might say - how would we know? The obvious method, unless you see them, is by spotting their droppings. We usually saw the droppings on the lawn, they were black, often 2 or 3 inches long, flattish deposits. We had regular visits until about 5 months ago. We have no idea why they aren't coming to our garden any more. I know other people in the village have spotted them in their gardens.

Hedgehogs have been in serious decline. There are various reasons, some of the most common being-getting run over on roads, gardens being very tidy with no piles of leaves or wood where they could hibernate, and close board fencing which can stop them moving from garden to garden. It is quite easy to just dig a small hole under the fence so they can squeeze through. When we knew we had these prickly visitors we bought a hedgehog house and some dried food especially for hedgehogs. We also had a wildlife camera which we could set up on a tripod. This was triggered by movement, and we captured lots of stills and quite a bit of video. Great fun for our grandchildren.

Please think about making your garden hedgehog friendly - they'll eat your slugs!
