So also will **Rosemary Partridge**, who is also retiring as Co-ordinator of the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, again after **12 years** service. The editor was unable to attend this meeting, but is grateful for the notes supplied by Martin Wilkes. There is no space left to report all the matters raised at this meeting, hopefully this will be done next month.

THE AGM of the PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL was held on April 26th and **David Johnstone** and **Meg Benn** were re-elected as Churchwardens. **Doreen Buck** retired from the PCC after having served continuously for **60 years.** St. Denys Church and the whole village owe her a huge amount of gratitude for her commitment to both church and community. Thanks were also expressed for the excellent work **Peter Smith** does as Church Treasurer.

The cost of the quinquennial repairs and maintenance of St. Denys have risen to over £30,000 allowing for recovery of VAT. This was due to the discovery of a further section of stonework in need of replacement. The Church Funds are, thankfully, sufficient to cope with this cost but regular fundraising is necessary.

EASTER SUNDAY. Many thanks to all those who donated flowers and lilies and to those who decorated the Church. St. Denys looked its best and the choir added to the beauty of the service.

CHURCH FETE – SUNDAY, 9th AUGUST. With Radio Northampton coming with the Green Welly Show from 12 noon until the Fete opens at 2 pm these two hours will be utilised to provide Ploughman's Lunches (cheese only) for £2.50. OBITUARIES

HUBERT BOTT 1930-2009 by his daughter, Sandra Towers

Dad was born in Long Buckby and came to work in Ravensthorpe in 1955 when he took over running the Co-op in Chequers Lane. After his marriage to Eve in March 1956 they came to live in the Co-op house opposite the pub. They moved to East Haddon Road in1964.

Hubert took part in many aspects of village life. In the early days he played cricket. Later he ferried the teenage lads to Northampton to play in a five-aside league. He served on the Playing Field's Committee and was involved in the village festivals in the early 1970's.

His job took him mainly to London, but he had an encyclopaedic knowledge of the UK road system and was often called upon to be an airport taxi or to be Ravensthorpe's early version of satnay.

As he neared retirement age he helped found the bowls club and became chairman and booking secretary of the Village Hall.

He gave up these jobs in 2004 after suffering a stroke. The stroke left him with a speech problem and he went out less and less, content to be in the garden in summer and watch his favourite TV programmes in winter.

His health had deteriorated over the last year but he was only very poorly for five days. We managed to fulfil his wish and he was at home with Mum and I when he died on March 17th – their wedding anniversary

ROY ASTROP 1931-2009 by his wife, Margaret

Roy died on the 11th March and, on being asked about an obituary, I came to the conclusion that nothing would capture his spirit and attitude to life more than the following words, written by our elder son Ian.

"On remembering conversations with my father it seemed that, be it events in his childhood, his National Service in the RAF, to his long career in the shoe trade, the house moves, being made redundant several times, working on the markets, and going to work in India in his sixties; he met all these events not with trepidation, but head on, viewing each as a challenge and a new adventure to be taken on. He had this outlook socially as well. In the various moves to different locations, he soon made friends and enjoyed being part of the community.

It was this positive attitude that helped those around him face the inevitable outcome of his illness, always maintaining that if he wasn't going to beat it, he was going to do his best to last longer than the doctors gave him. An attitude he maintained to the very last day."

He loved all social occasions, particularly with the family, where his sense of fun came to the fore. He was a keen bowls player and also took up bell ringing at the parish church whilst we lived in Norfolk

I know he will be sadly missed not only by us, but all who knew him..
