THE PARISH MEETING -22nd APRIL. As reported last month John Matts is retiring as Chairman of the Parish Council after 18 years service (not 12 as stated last month). He hopes to remain on the Council so his experience and wisdom will not be lost. With Rosemary Partridge retiring as co-ordinator of the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme a new co-ordinator is being sought. A brief summary of other matters follows. VILLAGE HALL - Trevor Foss thanked his committee for another successful year. Funds stand currently at £18,000 but this is being "ring fenced" for the Hall improvements. The hall has been used regularly making it a busy hub of village life. THE POLICE REPORT was given by Glyn Lewis showing a reduction in reported crimes from 16 in 2007 to 10 in 2008. Glynn asked villagers to report "Bag-Knockers" (people hawking dusters etc. door to door) to the police on 08453 700700. Crimes have been reported where these teams are operating. Residents are requested to ensure that houses, garages and sheds are securely locked as burglary is moving out of town due to a recent police crack downs there. POCKET PARK - It was agreed to set aside an area with a tree and bench in memory of Pat Patrick who was instrumental in providing this beautiful and quiet corner of the village. **DOG MESS** - This problem continues especially in Top Ardles Wood, the set-aside land above the reservoir and on the playing field where dog faeces can spread dangerous diseases to children. Unfortunately, it appears that local residents are mostly to blame. The Daventry Dog Warden has been called in to make patrols and she has the power to make on the spot fines. It is a requirement that dogs be on a lead when walked across the playing field. STREET LIGHTING - The possibility of incorporating timers to switch off the lights at midnight is being investigated. POT HOLES – The County Council have undertaken a survey of the state of local roads and deep holes have been marked for repair. PLAYING FIELD - Martin Wilkes reported on the success of four fund raising events, Odds 200 lottery, Quiz Night, Race Night and Firework Display and also the contribution from Hollowell Steam Rally for the volunteers who manned stands. He thanked, amongst many others, the support of Gordon and Gill Walker at The Chequers. Maintenance and repair works have been carried out and improvements planned.

CHURCH FETE – **SUNDAY**, 9th **AUGUST.** Plans for the Fete are well underway. The event will start at 12 noon with the BBC's Green Welly Show including a Ploughman's Lunch and Flower Arranging demonstration. The Bric-a-Brac stall will be open. The Fete proper will be opened at 2.00pm by local BBC Radio's **Kevin Saddington.** Features of the show will include Daventry Model Boat Club, Flying Model Airplanes, Corby Scouts' Band, Jazz Pianist, Teas & Cakes, at least 8 stalls and much, much more.
