CRABTREE POCKET PARK NEWS – by Cliff Giles (Pocket Park Coordinator)

There are many different types of trees in the Pocket Park, but because they have grown vigorously in the 11 years since they were planted it had become impossible to see any except those at the front. A rough path has now been cut and cleared that allows visitors to wander with care through the little wooded section. Later in the year there are plans to coppice some of the trees to allow more light and increase wildlife diversity. This area, like the rest of the Pocket Park is an ideal place to "get away from it all". Many thanks to Glyn and Margaret Lewis for all their hard work in creating the track and also to Alan Mold who has taken over the mowing of the path. It has never looked so good!

Ever since the Pocket Park began, care has been taken to ensure that only native plants were used and it seems possible that the Australian Stonecrop that is proving such a problem in the pond was introduced when someone put fish into the pond some years ago (this weed was also used in aquariums). To prevent problems like this arising again in the future please do not introduce new species of plants into the Pocket Park. Just come and enjoy it.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH – Ian Baverstock, Watch Scheme Coordinator writes:- Currently there is a lot of national interest in **"Smart Water"**. It is a foolproof way of marking your possessions so that in the event of theft your goods can be returned to you. It also aids the police in bringing a prosecution as whenever anyone is arrested in suspicious circumstances they are checked for Smart Water contamination. I am told it lasts for some weeks and does not wash off, rather it wears off over time. This means that if someone has been in contact with your stolen goods that person can be linked to the crime. The simplest/cheapest way that Smart Water can be obtained is by buying a kit costing about £18.80. The kit comes with window stickers warning potential thieves that your possessions are marked. The stickers are impossible to obtain without the kit so thieves know they are genuine.

If anyone would like a kit then please get in touch and, when I have sufficient numbers (I need at least 10), I will order the kits. You can also order direct from <u>http://www.smartwater.com/Home.aspx</u>.
